May I join in the welcome extended to all you generous people who have once again answered the call of Rotary Club of Nairobi North to come to this Premier arranged in support of your Children's Hospital at Gertrude's Garden.

The Hospital is, like the Nairobi Show, "on the move" and we are contemplating very considerable enlargements in the future. The need for a great increase in Paediatric Hospital beds is easy to estimate where one observes the great population explosion of the country - all populations start as Children as most parents are very well aware - and of the 13 million people in Kenya to-day about 7 million are under 15 years of age. Most of these Children are well fed and healthy; many however are neither, and even the healthy Children have accidents or become ill from time to time.

We are contemplating an increase in our beds to be built in conjunction with the Bohra Road Clinic for the Physically disabled as well as our existing commitments; to bring us frem 50 to 100 beds. This could be an expensive venture with an initial capital outlay in the order to $£ 300,000$ we have plans outlined for such development, and Rotary are anxious to take part in this scheme.

We need a modest sum of money to-night to finance a film perhaps, a brochure to expound the detail of the idea so as to interest the world; a little bonito to catch a marlin? But even bonitos cost money to produce.

We would like to take this opportunity of thanking you all for your support to-night and for your great generosity to our Hospital in the past.

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## ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

## LARRY OAKS

Director and Choreographer for "Kismet" is LARRY OAKS. This is Mr. Oaks' second visit to Nairobi: he was responsible for the overall direction of the Nairobi City Players' last musical in this theatre - the recordbreaking "FIDDLER ON THE ROOF".

Larry Oaks is a 36-year-old Jerseyman, whose career has taken him to many countries. He started in professional show business as a Dancer in a revue at the Theatre Royal, Windsor. He then toured in 'LOVE FROM JUDY', after which he went into the West End at the Prince of Wales Theatre in the Follies Bergere Revues for eighteen months and also played in cabaret at Churchill's Club, Bond Street and the Don Juan, in Grosvenor Square. He did T.V. for a number of years and was in the Rodgers and Hammerstein 'CINDERELLA' at the London Coliseum. In 1960, he went into 'OLIVER!' at the New Theatre as dancer and Ballet Master for six years, during which time he staged the Broadway production at the Imperial Theatre, New York. He has staged 'OLIVER!' in Los Angeles, in Holland (in Dutch) and at the Habimah National Theatre, Tel Aviv (in Hebrew). He worked on 'THE PRIME OF MISS JEAN BRODIE', starring Vanessa Redgrave at Wyndham's Theatre, London, where he staged the Tango for two girls, one of whom - Olivia Hussey - was later to play Juliet in Zefferelli's 'ROMEO AND JULIET', Romeo being played by Leonard Whiting, who had been in 'OLIVER!' as the Artful Dodger. He has choreographed dance sequences for several of A.T.V.'s 'PLAY OF THE MONTH' series; amongst the artists were Paul Schofield in Strindberg's 'DANCE OF DEATH' and Celia Johnson in 'HELEN and EDWARD and HENRY'. He worked on a film called 'THE FLIGHT OF THE DOVES', starring Ron Moody and Jack Wild, which was shot in Ireland and due to be released sinurtly. He worked on 'THE SONG OF NORWAY' which was shot entirely on location in Norway and Denmark and was the first musical to be filmed in Cinerama,

Since last September Mr. Oaks has been at the York Theatre Royal as choreographer and direcior. He was one of the main directors and organisers of an International Youth Festival held in York to commemorate that city's 1,500 anniversary, working with 1,600 performers presenting 85 performances in 2 weeks. Since he was here last year for "FIDDLER" he has also staged a "rock" musical called "THE LAST DAYS OF ISAAC" which went to the English National Theatre (Old Vic) and directed a new play by Henry Livings called "GRUP". He also co-directed another new play - "STRINGER'S LAST STAND" by Stan Barstow and Alfred Bradley, who wrote "A KIND OF LOVING". After "KISMET" opens he will go back to York to direct a pantomime. He will then start work on a film based on the life of Johann Strauss, which will be shot on location in Vienna.

The Nairobi City Players find it both rewarding and satisfying to work with somebody so thoroughly professional as Mr. Oaks. It is not surprising therefore that they have invited him back to Nairobi again in June of next year to direct another of their' musicals. This could be "MAN OF LA MANCHA".

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## ABOUT THE SHOW

"Kismet" is aptly described by its authors as "a Musical Arabian Night". In brief, it tells the story of one day in the life of Hajj, the poet beggar, who gains wealth, avenges wrongs done to his daughter, discovers new love and, eventually, triumphs over an evil Wazir to become an Emir of Baghdad. Paralleling his story is that of his daughter, Marsinah, who falls in love with a young gardener who is later revealed as the mighty Caliph in disguise. A fairy story? Yes, but one which has enthralled audiences for decades as book, play, film and then full scale musical.

Although it is set in ancient Baghdad there is nothing dated about "Kismet" - in fact it fits superbly into the modern musical mould wherein singers and dancers must be equally adept as actors. For "Kismet" has everything that a modern musical needs to make it a success: exciting music and dancing, interesting characters, a first class story told by a witty script, and a stage full of colour and movement. Throughout the story runs a constant thread of splendour and magnificence in the imaginative settings and costumes and the pictorial excitement of exotic dances, imperial processions, market place crowds and the swirling panoply of the Arabian Nights brought to life.

In an inspired moment, the authors chose the music of Alexander Borodin to illustrate the story and it is a happy combination. The music was especially adapted by Robert Wright and George Forrest, who similarly adapted the music of Grieg for "Song of Norway". They have drawn freely and imaginatively from Borodin's compositions and it is interesting to note the derivation of some of the major songs from the show. "Fate" comes from the Symphony No. 2 in B Minor, and "Rhymes Have I" from the last act of the opera "Prince Igor". "Not Since Nineveh" "Stranger in Paradise", and "He's in Love" are all from the Polovtsian Dances, and Borodin's First Symphony is the source of "Gesticulate". A piano composition called "Serenade" provides "Night of My Nights", while the D Major Quartet becomes "Was I Wazir?" and from its third movement comes the lovely "And This is My Beloved". "The Olive Tree" has been adapted from the Love Duet of "Prince Igor", and "Sands of Time" from "In the Steppes of Central Asia".
"Kismet" opened at the Ziegfield Theatre, New York in December, 1953 with a cast headed by Alfred Drake, Dorotta Morrow and Joan Diener, and was a fabulous success. In the Spring of 1955 the same stars opened the London run at the Stoll Theatre which was equally successful running for two years.

## ABOUT THE MUSICAL DIRECTOR



TONY DAVIES

The Musical Director for "Kismet" is TONY DAVIES, who is well known in Nairobi music circles as a very talented pianist.

Born in 1940 in Caterham, Surrey, Tony cannot remember when he first started playing the piano although a photograph of him aged two looking baffled at the keyboard would indicate that it was fairly early. During his school days he learned to play the piano well and the 'cello' less well. He then went on to four hectic years at Keble College, Oxford pursuing a wide range of other interests and eventually acquiring a degree, a diploma and a fiancee from Kenya. The latter, now his wife, Alison, was the reason for his arrival in Kenya to teach for two years at the then Prince of Wales School (now Nairobi School). There, himself taught and encouraged by Jack Lockhart (whom many theatre goers will remember as musical director of Nairobi shows in years gone by) music again became an absorbing interest and he then studied for, and obtained his Licentiate of the Royal Schools of Music. Tony again put his nose to the grindstone, changed careers and, after three years, qualified in accountancy, a profession he now pursues between concerts and shows! It should be added here that he has ample encouragement to follow his bent as he has married into a very musical family. His mother-in-law is Jean Gill, whose fine contralto voice has been heard in many Nairobi musicals, and particularly Gilbert and Sullivan. Both his wife and sister-in-law, Hilary, are singers.

Playing the piano, organ or harpsichord, singing or conducting, Tony has been involved in many musical events. Hidden from view with the other troglodytes in the orchestra pit, he has played in several shows including "The Merry Widow", "The Gypsy Baron" for Nairobi Musical Society, "The Pirates of Penzance" and "The Beggars Opera", for Nairobi Musical Society and the Theatre Group combined. Last year he emerged above waist level to conduct "The Gondoliers" also staged by the same combination.

He has been principally active recently in chamber music and this year has given two major concerts, the most recent being this month at the National Theatre when he played the Schumann Piano Concerto with the Nairobi Orchestra, under the baton of Nat Kofsky. Tony considered this his most demanding musical challenge to date - until he saw the score of "Kismet"!

In September 1956 an "acting group" was formed to be known as the Nairobi City Players, and in its Constitution set down the following aims and objects:-
(a) Regularly to present theatrical productions of a good dramatic and artistic standard by utilising and co-ordinating the best available acting talent, producers, set designers and technical stage assistants.
(b) Towards the fulfilment of (a) above, to be unstinting in the cost of production, subject to the limit set by the Standing Committee.
(c) To take all necessary steps to encourage the drama and to improve the facilities available for theatrical productions.
The City Players have adhered rigidly to these aims from their formation and since that time have presented at the National Theatre, Nairobi, a total of 58 productions including 14 full scale musicals (both figures include the current production of "Kismet").
