


Hello Larry, Well, Hello, Larry it's so nice to have you back where you belong...

Larry Oaks, professional London producer and choreographer, flew Alitalia from London to Nairobi for the Nairobi City Player's production of 'Hello Dolly', the world's smash hit musical.



ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

Director and Choreographer for "Hello, Dolly!" is LARRY OAKS. At the Nairobi City Players' invitation Mr. Oaks has already made two previous visits to Nairobi when he directed for them "FIDDLER ON THE ROOF" and "KISMET".

Larry Oaks is a 37-year old Jerseyman whose career has taken him to many countries. He started in professional show business as a dancer in a revue at the Theatre Royal, Windsor. He then toured in "LOVE FROM JUDY", after which he went into the West End at the Prince of Wales Theatre in the Follies Bergere Revues for eighteen months and also played in cabaret at Churchills Club. Bond Street and the Don Juan, in Grosvenor Square. He did T.V. for a number of years and was in the Rodgers and Hammerstein "CINDERELLA" at the London Coliseum. In 1960, he went into "OLIVER" at the New Theatre as dancer and Ballet Master for six years, during which time he staged the Broadway production at the Imperial Theatre, New York. He has staged "OLIVER" in Los Angeles, in Holland (in Dutch) and at the Habimah National

rneatre, Tel Aviv (in Hebrew). He worked on "THE PRIME OF MISS JEAN BRODIE", starring Vanessa Redgrave, at Wyndham's Theatre, London, when he staged the Tango for two girls, one of whom — Olivia Hussey — was later to play Juliet in Zefferelli's "ROMEO AND JULIET", Romeo being played by Leonard Whiting, who had been in "OLIVER" as the Artful Dodger. He has choreographed dance sequences for several of A.T.V.'s "PLAY OF THE MONTH" series; amongst the artists were Paul Schofield in Strindberg's "DANCE OF DEATH" and Celia Johnson in "HELEN and EDWARD and HENRY". He worked on a film called "THE FLIGHT OF THE DOVES", starring Ron Moody and Jack Wild, which was shot in Ireland. He also worked on "THE SONG OF NORWAY" which was shot entirely on location in Norway and Denmark and was the first musical to be filmed in Cinerama. During 1971 Larry Oaks was at the York Theatre Royal as choreographer and director. He was one of the main directors and organisers of an International Youth Festival held in York to commemorate that city's 1,500 anniversary, working with 1,600 performers presenting 85 performances in 2 weeks. He also staged a "rock" musical called "THE LAST DAYS OF ISAAC" which went to the English National Theatre (Old Vic) and directed a new play by Henry Livings called "GRUP". He co-directed another new play — "STRINGER'S LAST STAND" by Stan Barstow and Alfred Bradley, who wrote "A KIND OF LOVING". Last Christmas he directed a pantomime at the York Theatre Royal. He then spent most of this year working on the film "THE GREAT WALTZ", based on the life of Johann Strauss and shot in location in Vienna. This should be seen on Nairobi screens in the near future.

The Nairobi City Players find it both rewarding and satisfying to work with a director so thoroughly professional as Larry Oaks and to show their appreciation have made him an Honorary Member of the group. They have every intention of retaining their association and have invited Mr. Oaks to direct "MAN OF LA MANCHA" in June of next year. Larry says he is always delighted to come to Kenya and he loves the country (when he is able to take time off from his intensive rehearsal schedule). The Nairobi City Players are thinking of calling him their "Resident Guest Director".

ABOUT THE SHOW

"Hello, Dolly!" begins early one summer morning in New York City in the year 1898. Dolly Levi, born Gallagher, the jack-of-all trades widow of one Ephraim Levi, is on her way to Yonkers, New York, to arrange the second marriage of Mr. Horace Vandergelder, the well known half-amillionaire — in truth she intends to marry him herself — and she reveals what sort of woman she is as she sings "I Put My Hand In".

Meanwhile in Yonkers, we meet Horace Vandergelder, his long suffering clerks, Cornelius and Barnaby, and his weeping niece Ermengarde. Vandergelder, who believes that everyone in the world with the possible exception of himself is a fool, explains why he has decided to do that most foolish thing, marry again, as he sings "It Takes a Woman".

Dolly arrives in Yonkers and proceeds to clear the field of all rivals including Mrs. Irene Molloy, a young widow she herself presented to Vandergelder, by telling Vandergelder about a great catch — an heiress — one Ernestina Money whom she will introduce to him that very afternoon when he marches in the 14th Street Association Parade. Vandergelder agrees and goes off to New York on business. Meanwhile, his two clerks, Cornelius and Barnaby, decide they have had enough of Yonkers and are going off to New York to do some living it up before it is too late. Cornelius sings to Barnaby about the wonders of the big city and is joined by Dolly as she tries to persuade Ermengarde that it is time for her to rebel, too — "Put On Your Sunday Clothes".

In New York City again, we meet Mrs. Molloy, whom Vandergelder has been considering as a second wife. Tired of her dull existence as a milliner and longing for some adventure herself she sings "Ribbons Down My Back". By chance, Cornelius and Barnaby, take refuge in her shop to avoid meeting Vandergelder and, while they are hidden in cupboards and under tables, Dolly, Mrs. Molloy and Minnie Fay—Mrs. Molloy's assistant — distract the suspicious Vandergelder with "Motherhood".

Despite their best efforts, Vandergelder discovers that there are men in the shop, and though he does not know who the men are, he is angry enough to break off relations with Mrs. Molloy and inform Mrs. Levi that he will meet her "heiress" that evening at the end of the parade. Mrs. Molloy is furious and Dolly, seeing that Cornelius is much taken with the young widow, patches things up and arranges for Cornelius and Barnaby to take Mrs. Molloy and Minnie Fay to dinner at the Harmonia Gardens Restaurant. Cornelius, mindful of the fact that he has something less than three dollars in his pocket, suggests that they couldn't go to a fashionable place like the Harmonia Gardens because they have dancing there and he doesn't know how to dance. And so Dolly teaches Cornelius and Barnaby to dance as she sings "Dancing".

An exhuberant Cornelius takes Mrs. Molloy off to see the 14th Street Parade and Dolly, having brought them together, is once more alone. She speaks to her late husband, Ephraim Levi, and explains why she wants to marry Horace Vandergelder. She is tired of leading a safe, solitary existence and longs to "rejoin the human race". The scene changes to 14th Street at night as Dolly, joined by all the marchers, restates her determination as she sings "Before the Parade Passes By" and the curtain falls on Act I.

Act II begins with Cornelius and Barnaby convincing Mrs. Molloy and Minnie Fay that the really "elegant" way for them to go down to the Harmonia Gardens Restaurant is to walk, as they sing "Elegance".

Meanwhile at the Harmonia Gardens Restaurant, the entire staff is buzzing with the news that Dolly is coming back for the first time since Ephraim Levi's death. By eight o'clock, the excitement has reached fever pitch as the curtains of the main entrance part and Mrs. Levi, resplendent in a glittering red dress, starts down the stairs. "Hello, Dolly!"

Dolly pulls out all the stops as she sets about hooking Vandergelder. First she assumes that he wants to marry her and firmly turns him down; then she paints a dreary picture of what life in Yonkers will be without her. During the confusion engendered by his discovering not only Cornelius and Barnaby, but also his niece Ermengarde, in the Harmonia Gardens Restaurant Vandergelder discovers that his well-ordered existence is somewhat less than that. He discharges Cornelius on the spot and is amazed to hear his once humble clerk take this blow with equanimity and declare his love for Mrs. Molloy in front of one and all as he sings "It Only Takes a Moment".

In the court to which he has been taken for creating a disturbance at the Harmonia Gardens, Vandergelder — obdurate as ever — hears Dolly tell him the only thing she can say under the circumstances — "So Long Dearie".

Early next morning and back in Yonkers, Vandergelder, now without clerks, without niece, and without Dolly, realises he's been as big a fool as anyone else — and he'd be an even greater fool if he let this wonderful woman out of his life. So he asks Dolly, who conveniently returns having expected just such a turn of events, to forgive him and marry him as he sings "Hello, Dolly!" and the curtain falls.

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ABOUT THE MUSICAL DIRECTOR



TONY DAVIES

The Musical Director for "Hello, Dolly!" is TONY DAVIES, who is well known in Nairobi music circles as a very talented pianist.

Born in 1940 in Caterham, Sprrey, Tony cannot remember when he first started playing the piano although a photograph of him aged two looking baffled at the keyboard would indicate that it was fairly early. During his school days he learned to play the piano well and the 'cello' less well. He then went on to four hectic years at Keble College. Oxford pursuing a wide range of other interests and eventually acquiring a degree, a diploma and a fiancee from Kenya. The latter, now his wife, Alison, was the reason for his arrival in Kenya to teach for two years at the then Prince of Wales School (now Nairobi School). There, himself taught and encouraged by Jack Lockhart (whom many theatres goers will remember as musical director of Nairobi shows in years gone

by) music again became an absorbing interest and he then studied for, and obtained his Licentiate of the Royal Schools of Music. Tony again put his nose to the grindstone, changed careers and, after three years, qualified in accountancy, a profession he now pursues between concerts and shows! It should be added here that he has ample encouragement to follow his bent as he has married into a very musical family. His mother-in-law is Jean Gill, whose fine contralto voice has been heard in many Nairobi musicals, and particularly Gilbert and Sullivan. Both his wife and sister-in-law, Hilary, are singers.

Playing the piano, organ or harpsichord, singing or conducting, Tony has been involved in many musical events. Hidden from view with the other troglodytes in the orchestra pit, he has played in several shows including "The Merry Widow", "The Gypsy Baron" for Nairobi Musical Society, "The Pirates of Penzance" and "The Beggars Opera", for Nairobi Musical Society and the Theatre Group combined. In 1971 he emerged above waist level to conduct "The Gondoliers" also staged by the same combination.

He has been principally active recently in chamber music and this year has given two major concerts, the most recent being at the National Theatre when he played the Schumann Piano Concerto with the Nairobi Orchestra, under the baton of Nat Kofsky. Last Christmas Tony Davies was the Musical Director for the City Players production of "Kismet", also under Larry Oaks' direction.
