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ABOUT THE SHOW AND THE COMPOSER

"Salad Days" was originally staged at the Bristol Old Vic in 1954. At that time Julian Slade was the resident composer there, and Dorothy Reynolds (the joint author) one of the leading actresses. It proved so successful that in August, 1954, it was transferred to the Vaudeville Theatre, London, where it ran for years and years and years.

It is a summer story set in London during a heat-wave. Timothy and Jane, on leaving their University, are beset by their parents — that *she* should marry well, that *he* should choose a career, following in the footsteps of one of his influential uncles. The two meet in the park, and decide to simplify life by marrying each other and taking the first job that comes along.

An unusual opportunity presents itself in the shape of a Tramp they meet, who offers them seven pounds a week to look after his old street piano for a period of one month. They discover that the piano has the power to make all who hear it dance. They take it over with enthusiasm and very soon have the whole town — from street urchins to policemen and Bishops — dancing to its tune.

News of this irregular gaiety reaches the ears of the Minister of Pleasure and Pastime (one of Timothy's uncles), who, in his anxiety to restrict the high spirits of the nation, attempts to suppress the piano. Timothy and Jane succeed in hiding the piano from him, but find to their distress that it is really lost.

They are assisted in their search to find the piano, by Zed, a zany scientist (another of Timothy's uncles) who conveniently owns a flying saucer. He arrives at the right moment to give them a lift, and they are able to spot the piano from the regions of the upper air. On descending to earth they discover that it is the Tramp who has been hiding the piano in order to protect it. Their month of guardianship is over, and they hand back the piano to him, sad to part with it, but hopeful of a future as gay as the past.

It's all a bit of a fairy story as you will see but a charming one at that. It's a particularly happy musical comedy, with no messages whatsoever, except perhaps, that it's fun to be young and enjoying ones salad days.

It is interesting to note that author/composer Julian Slade is the nephew of Humphrey Slade and first cousin of Nigel Slade, both well known to the Nairobi stage; in fact Nigel is appearing in three parts in the show. It would appear that Julian Slade has another success on his hands as his latest musical "Trelawney" (based on the "Trelawney of Wells") is about to be transferred to a London West End theatre. Like "Salad Days" Mr. Slade's current show has had its "try out" at the Bristol Old Vic.

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

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

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NAIROBI CITY PLAYERS

In September 1956 an "acting group" was formed to be known as the Nairobi City Players, and in its Constitution set down the following aims and objects:—

- (a) Regularly to present theatrical productions of a good dramatic and artistic standard by utilising and co-ordinating the best available acting talent, producers, set designers and technical stage assistants.
- (b) Towards the fulfilment of (a) above, to be unstinting in the cost of production, subject to the limit set by the Standing Committee.
- (c) To take all necessary steps to encourage the drama and to improve the facilities available for theatrical productions.

The City Players have adhered rigidly to these aims from their formation and since that time have presented at the National Theatre, Nairobi, a total of 60 productions including 15 full scale musicals (both figures include the current production of "Salad Days").

In addition to the Committee there is an Associate Membership limited to 50 Members.

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
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
