ABOUT THE COMPOSER

Stephen Sondheim was born in New York on March 22nd 1930. He attended the George School in Newtown, Pennsylvania, and Williams College, where he majored in music. At College he wrote book, music and lyrics for two school productions. Winning the Hutchison Prize enabled him to devote two years of study in composition in New York with Milton Babbitt. In 1953 he was co-author of the scripts for the Television Series "Topper", and one year after that he completed music and lyrics for musical "A Saturday Night", which never reached Broadway due to the death of its producer.

While writing scripts for the Columbia Broadcasting system and background music for the Broadway Play "Girls of Summer", he worked on the lyrics for "West Side Story", for which he achieved renown. For "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum" a major success, and "Anyone Can Whistle" a box office failure, he wrote both the music and the lyrics. For two other musicals he wrote only the lyrics, while Julie Styne wrote the Music for one, (Funny Girl) and Richard Rodgers for another, (Do I Hear A Waltz). He wrote both words and music for "Company" in 1970.

More recently Stephen Sondheim has become a name synonymous with success on the London Theatre Scene. "A Little Night Music" for which Stephen Sondheim wrote the music and lyrics, enjoyed an immensely popular run at the Adelphi Theatre and was again directed by Harold Prince. This show is to be made into a film starring Elizabeth Taylor. "A Little Night Music" also won the London Critics Award as the best musical for 1975. At present showing in London is "Side by Side by Sondheim" which is described as a musical entertainment, by Stephen Sondheim (music and lyrics), Leonard Bernstein, Mary Rodgers, Richard Rodgers, and Julie Styne. This production is proving most popular and is running at the Wyndham Theatre at present.

It is to be hoped that more music and lyrics will flow from the pen of this most talented composer and lyricist in the not too distant future.

ABOUT THE SHOW

A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum is a musical based on the works of Plaustus and is set in Rome in 200 BC.

It opened at the Alvin Theatre New York on 8th May 1962, and had an unbroken run of 964 performances until it closed on 29th August, 1964. The Original production was presented by the well known empresario Harold Prince and starred Zero Mostel as Pseudolus.

A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum was the joint winner of the best production in New York for 1963 along with "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf" It won 6 Tony Awards including the following, Best Musical by Stephen Sondheim, Best Musical Play with authors Burt Shevelove and Lorry Gelbart, Best Director, George Abbott, Best Musical Producer, Hal Prince, Best Actor, Zero Mostel and Best Supporting Actor David Burns.


In 1966 United Artists released "A Funny Thing" starring once again Zero Mostel as Fseudolus, Jack Gifford as Hysterium and also included Phil Silvers as Lycus and Buster Keaton in a small supporting role.

The Show was later staged in London starring Frankie Howerd as Pseudolus. The London production gave rise to the television services "Up Pompeii" which also starred Frankie Howerd.

Now Nairobi City Players are very pleased to present "A Funny Thing Happened on the Way to the Forum" for the first time in East Africa.

ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

BENNY GOODMAN is affectionately accepted to be the "Resident Genius" of the Nairobi City Players. Another man of the Theatre, Mr. Noel Coward, once referred to himself as "Jack of all trades — master of most". Should one venture this description to fit Benny he would undoubtedly contest it adding "make it — master of all, mate". This is not to signify arrogance in any way on his part, merely a supreme confidence in his own ability which is generally abundantly justified. I speak with some authority having had the pleasure to work with Benny in the theatre for more than twenty-five years.

Benny has been associated with the Nairobi City Players from their first production in November, 1956, "The Love of Four Colonels" for which he was Stage Director. But before that, since his arrival in Kenya in 1950, he worked with other groups in the Kenya National Theatre and in other fields of entertainment, including a clown act with an old "banger" of a car which exploded in all directions.

He has done almost everything in theatre and, over the past twenty years, mostly for this group. He is a Stage Director, Actor, Set Designer, Singer, Lighting Designer, Dancer, Play Director, Choreographer, Set Constructor, Scenic Artist and, now, one of his cherished ambitions achieved in this production, Musical Director of "Forum" as well as being its overall Production Director. So far he hasn't taken much interest in Business Management or Publicity or even wanting to be the Chairman of this Group but it is, I think only a matter of time.

I should like to pay Benny a sincere tribute for the outstanding work he has achieved for this group and to remember with pleasure some of the highlights:- as an actor: "The Cowardly Lion" (Maridadi Simba) in "The Wizard of Oz", "Arthur Groomkirby" in "One Way Pendulum", "Nicely-Nicely Johnson" in "Guys and Dolls", "First Gangster" in Kiss Me Kate", a double of "Twimble" and "Womper" in "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying', "Sancho Panza" in "Man of La Mancha" and most recently, "Fagin" in "Oliver"

Amongst memorable productions directed by Benny were "Kiss Me Kate", "The Real Inspector Hound", "Another Opening" and "Minstrels "74 and "75".

He has also done outstanding work as a Lighting Designer and Operator for many of our productions and those of other groups. He was set designer for the eleven sets for "My Fair Lady" and was Lighting Designer for "Godspell". He was Resident Stage Manager of the Kenya Drama Festival and the Kenya Schools Drama Festival for many years.

From his arrival in 1950, Benny worked for many years with E.A. Posts and Telecommunications. Ten years ago he took up another career, that of Computor Consultant, which is particularly appropriate to his talents and is now a director of Data Centre, Ltd., Kenyatta Avenue. His wife, Brenda, is the hardworking Secretary to the group, and his two children Gail and Glen also take a keen interest in Theatre.

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

NAIROBI CITY PLAYERS

IN September, 1956 an "acting group" was formed to be known as the Nairobi City Players, and in its Constitution set down the following aims and objects:—

- (a) Regularly to present theatrical productions of a good dramatic and artistic standard by utilising and co-ordinating the best available acting talent, producers, set designers and technical stage assistants.
- (b) Towards the fulfilment of (a) above, to be unstinting in the cost of production, subject to the limit set by the Standing Committee.
- (c) To take all necessary steps to encourage the drama and to improve the facilities available for theatrical productions.

The City Players have adhered rigidly to these aims from their formation and since that time have presented a total of 79 productions including 25 full scale musicals (figures include the current production), mostly at the Kenya National Theatre.
