
CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

The Rotary Club of Nairobi takes this opportunity of saying "WELCOME" and "THANK YOU".

We welcome the first night audience of a production which we are sure will be prominent in Nairobi Theatre history. We also thank the audience, the young people of the fledgling Rotaract Club of Nairobi, the Nairobi City Players, the donors of the raffle prizes and our many other helpers for their contributions towards our target of a Kidney Machine for the Nairobi Hospital.

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THE HISTORICAL BACKGROUND TO THE "KING AND I"

The meeting of the King of Siam and Anna Leonowens, which serves as the basis for Rodgers and Hammerstein's glorious musical "The King and I", actually occurred in Siam in the 1860's. In the latter half of the 19th Century and first decade of the 20th Siam was governed by perhaps its most capable and farseeing kings: Rama IV, better known as King Mongkut, and his son, Rama V, or King Chulalongkorn. These two rulers changed Siam from an insular feudal kingdom into a modern nation and enabled it to weather the tidal wave of European colonialism that engulfed all the neighbouring countries of South-east Asia.

A philosopher and theologian, King Mongkut, who had been a monk in a Budhist monastry for 27 years before his accession to the throne, also had a lively curiosity about the world and a great respect for science. He was also strongly influenced by the visible role of Europe and the United States in Far Eastern affairs. The event that most impelled his modernization of the country along Western lines was the Opium War of 1840, in which a once-proud China suffered a humiliating defeat at the hands of the British. If Siam were to avoid China's fate, she must modernize.

At his coronation in 1851, King Mongkut broke some centuries-old precedents; he invited foreign residents to the ceremony and he exempted them from the traditional requirement of prostrating themselves before the King. He invited many foreign advisers to serve in his administration and in 1862 he employed a British widow, Mrs. Anna Leonowens, to give English lessons to some of the 82 sons and daughters he had by his 35 wives. In old Siam it was not only a man's prerogative but a king's duty to have many wives as insurance that there would be plenty of heirs to the throne. Mongkut was constantly beseiged by noblemen wishing to offer their daughters to him in marriage, causing the king eventually to declare that he had more wives than he wanted; in fact he devised an ingenious law enabling his wives to "resign" and marry commoners if they so desired.

Before she left Siam, Mrs. Leonowens had the king's multitudinous children speaking excellent English and the Siamese government well on its way to many more liberal reforms. This was the same period when Abraham Lincoln was wrestling with slavery in his country and before Mrs. Leonowens was done with him, King Mongkut had an excellent working knowledge of Mr. Lincoln's ways and had been induced to apply many of the President's principles to Siam itself.

When Anna Leonowens returned to England after five years in Bangkok, she wrote two books entitled "A British Governess at the Court of Siam" and "The Romance of the Harem", which became the basis of Margaret Landon's best-seller "Anne and the King of Siam". Margaret Landon first became intrigued by the picture of the inner life of an Oriental Royal Court painted so vividly by the Englishwoman, who went to teach the Siamese King's many children, when she was living in Siam in the 1930's. Then, in 1939, an acquaintance who had himself spent some time in Siam wondered aloud if Mrs. Landon had "ever heard of his Aunt Annie". "Aunt Annie", of course, turned out to be Anna Leonowens. With this meeting Mrs. Landon picked up a great deal of important family background and two subsequent years of research finally culminated in "Anna and the King of Siam", which, in turn, inspired the highly successful Broadway musical and world-famous film "The King and I".

King Mongkut's son and successor, Chulalongkorn, was a teenager when his father died. Before coming of age to ascend the throne at 21, the young prince travelled extensively in Malaya, Java and India, learning about his neighbours - and getting a good look at Western colonialism in the process. What he saw convinced him that Siam must keep herself free from control by any of the European powers. At his coronation in 1873 Siamese subjects all prostrated themselves as tradition dictated in the presence of royalty. The moment he was crowned, Chulalongkorn announced that henceforth there would be no prostration before the King. In one of the most dramatic moments in Siamese history, the entire Court rose to its feet at the new king's words. It was the keynote of Chulalongkorn's forward looking rule and amongst many other achievements during his reign, he abolished slavery only three years after abolition was completed in the United States.



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ABOUT THE DIRECTOR

FERNAND MONAST



FERNAND MONAST comes to Kenya with a wealth of previous experience in the world of theatre.

He was born in Montreal, Canada, and started in theatre as a child aged 7. By the age of 15 he was directing his own productions and at the tender age of only 19 became Cultural Director of the Verdun Festivals. He completed his B.A. Degree at Ottawa University and became a teacher of Art in Verdun, Canada.

His education did not finish at University and he studied Drama at various lengths with Jean Doat, Grand Ballet and Singing. He went on from Montreal to London where he studied at R.A.D.A. and at the Royal Court Theatre under George Devine.

As an actor, singer and dancer he has appeared all over the United Kingdom, including the West End; his West End shows include "My Fair Lady", "Camelot", "Billy", "Man of La Mancha" and "High Diplomacy". He has also had engagements at various repertory theatres such as Canterbury and Windsor. Touring

shows are also part of his "portfolio", among these being "Camelot", "The Boyfriend" and "Guys and Dolls" to mention but a few. His horizons have extended beyond the United Kingdom and he has appeared in productions in Belgium, New York, South America, as well as touring with the Walt Disney Show in Europe.

In addition, films and television have occupied his attention and Fernand has appeared in "The Devils", "Alice in Wonderland", "Elizabeth Regina", "Henry VIII", "Strauss", "War and Peace", "Love for Lydia" and "Anna Karenina".

As a Director and Choreographer, he has been involved with shows such as "South Pacific", "My Fair Lady", "Grease" and "How To Succeed in Business" with semi-professional groups in London.

Fernand is a member of the Royal Academy of Dancing and (P.D.) A.R.A.D. and is presently Ballet Teacher at the Una Billings School of Dancing.

On his return to London in December he goes into intensive rehearsal for Pantomime to be presented in London over the festive season. In addition he is also directing a production of "My Fair Lady" to be presented in London in March.

This is Fernand Monast's first visit to Kenya.



THE STORY

The time is circa 1860 and the action takes place in Bangkok, Siam.

The story begins as the ship bringing the new English Governess, Anna, and her son, Louis, approaches Bangkok. As the ship draws to anchor, the Royal Barge approaches and the Kralahome (Prime Minister) alights. All does not seem well, but despite a warning from Captain Orton, Anna is determined to enter Bangkok.

Anna is then introduced to the King and one of the Royal Wives, Lady Thiang. The King has just received a present from the Prince of Burma, Lun Tha. The Royal Wives, Princes and Princesses are then commanded to appear and it is not long before they are all hard at work in the School Room, learning English and a variety of other subjects. Even the King is an interested pupil.

Anna takes the opportunity to ask the King to provide the house for her that he promised. He denies the request and after a stormy scene Anna walks out and returns to her room where she vents her fury in private.

Meanwhile, unknown to the King, Lun Tha and Tuptim have been meeting secretly, aided and abetted by the romantic Mrs. Anna. Lady Thiang, Chief Wife of the King, discovers their secret and strongly disapproves. She does not tell the King for fear of hurting him.

In the Palace the King is upset over rumours that he is known as a barbarian. He appeals to Anna for assurance and she makes overtures on his behalf to her old friend, Sir Edward Ramsay, a British diplomat stationed in Singapore.

A visit by Sir Edward is suddenly announced at very short notice and the King, anxious to create a good impression, plans to entertain the visitor with the assistance of Anna and Buddah.

The second act opens with Lady Thiang and the Royal Wives in the study, busy trying on European-style clothes in which they will be attired at the Ball being planned to welcome Sir Edward Ramsay. The dresses and European way of life appear strange and ridiculous to them and the arrival of Sir Edward in the Palace, sporting a monacle, sends them fleeing in terror in all directions. However, all is not lost and the King and Sir Edward escort Anna to the ballroom where they enjoy a royal feast, dancing and a ballet.

The ballet has been written by Tuptim and is entitled "Small House of Uncle Thomas", a Siamese version of "Uncle Tom's Cabin". Tuptim is the narrator with the Royal Dancers and Wives all participating. During the ballet Tuptim tries to tell the King about her own romance but only succeeds in angering him with her so-called "moral" play.

The evening has, however, been a success and the English visitors are impressed. They bid them farewell and the King is left alone with Anna. There are certain things about Western culture which the King does not understand and Anna tries her best to explain. They dance together until interrupted by the Kralahome who announces that Tuptim has been caught after trying to escape with her lover, Lun Tha. Tuptim is eventually whipped and, on hearing of the death of Lun Tha, escapes and stabs herself.

As the King lies dying, Lady Thiang is commanded to bring Anna to visit him before she leaves Bangkok. A reconciliation is effected and the King dies happily, knowing that Prince Chulalongkorn, his son, is well capable of taking over the throne, having been trained in the school of good government by the ubiquitous Mrs. Anna.

"The King and I"- A whole new Production

Rodgers and Hammerstein's "The King and I" has proved to be among the most sensitive and adult plays of our time, a work of art that has endured, even "youthened" over the past quarter century. Needless to say, the choice of Yul Brynner to play the original King proved to be most propitious and this was but a start of one of the great acting careers of our time.

The King and I premiered at the St. James Theatre on Broadway, March 29, 1951, and played 1,246 performances. Its triumph was later repeated in London, where it opened at the Drury Lane Theatre on October 8, 1953, and played for over two years.

Twentieth Century-Fox's memorable motion picture version of Rodgers and Hammerstein's musical was released in 1956. Yul Brynner recreated his role of the King of Siam and won the Academy Award as Best Actor. Deborah Kerr was his lovely Anna.

A highly acclaimed television series based on "Anna and the King of Siam" was a CBS-TV offering in the 1972 season, and a new generation fell in love with the Oriental king and the English governess.

Then in 1976, producers Lee Guber and Shelly Gross persuaded Yul Brynner to once again play the King of Siam for an 8-city national tour. The King and I fever returned, fresh and renewed after 25 years. The entire tour played to standing-room-only audiences in city after city, and the question asked over and over was "When are you bringing the show to Broadway". New York was waiting anxiously.

On May 2, 1977, Yul Brynner in Rodgers and Hammerstein's *The King and I* opened at Broadway's largest theatre, the 1933-seat Uris. "Don't call this a revival", Brynner warned. "This is a whole new production!"

In 1961 the Nairobi City Players presented "The King and I" as their first ever musical offering at the National Theatre. The production was directed by Robert Beamont and starred Peter Pearce as the King and Dulcie Atwill as Anna. Peter and Dulcie were at that time well-known to Nairobi audiences having played in several leading productions. Bryan Epsom took the role of the Kralahome and Mary Epsom was busy as usual as Costume Designer for the great multitude of costumes necessary for the production.

Now in 1977 Nairobi City Players are presenting "The King and I" as their final production for the year. Nairobi City Players have been in existence for 21 years and "The King and I" was unanimously considered as being most suitable as a revival of a previous musical, especially as both Peter Pearce and Dulcie Atwill had agreed to play the parts of the King and Anna once again. Bryan Epsom, now Chairman, takes charge of publicity and Mary Epsom has been hard at work as Costume Designer.



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

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

ABOUT THE MUSICAL DIRECTOR

NAT KOFSKY



Nairobi City Players are very pleased to have the services of Nat Kofsky as Musical Director for their revival production of "The King and I".

Nat was born in England and first studied music there, finishing his violin studies with the celebrated Professor Carl Flesch, then resident in London. Nat first arrived in Kenya in 1939, just in time to join the East African Forces. Among the many different nationalities in the army, he found some excellent musicians, and was able to inspire their talents to many different purposes. During this difficult period he presented many musical events throughout East Africa, and, from these humble beginnings, Nairobi's musical life expanded to the scope and depth we enjoy

In 1951 he was asked to return to Kenya as Director of the Kenya Conservatoire of Music. In these early days of the Conservatoire suitable accommodation was extremely hard to obtain and it is only in comparatively recent times that the Conservatoire moved to the present premises. Mr. Kofsky has watched the Institute grow over a period of 26 years and its success today must largely be attributed to his constant attention and guidance over the years.

In 1967 Nat was awarded an Honorary Degree of the Royal College of Music, London, and in 1975 the Order of the British Empire, both awards citing "for services to music in Africa".

During the last 16 years Nat has become known to a very wide public through his popular "Thursday Evening Concerts", broadcast by the Voice of Kenya. Over the last few years he has been conducting the Nairobi Orchestra, which has held many successful concerts and played for many musical productions in the Kenya National Theatre. As well as this work Nat has established an international concert life for Nairobi by arranging concert visits from many of the world's leading soloists and ensembles.

We have been fortunate in recent years to secure the services of Nat Kofsky as Musical Director for several musicals. In 1967 he began his association with Nairobi City Players when he was Musical Director for the highly successful production of "The Sound of Music". He returned again for "Guys and Dolls", "My Fair Lady", "Kiss Me Kate", "Fiddler on the Roof" and "Oliver", all highly successful productions in their own right. We are delighted to have Nat working with us once again in our new production of "The King and I".



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

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
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
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Desert Song and Show Boat. The Rodgers and Hammerstein collaboration spanned 16 years and began in 1943 with Oklahoma!, a show that changed the form and direction of musical theatre. They never repeated themselves; continuing with new, adventurous musicals: Carousel, Allegro, South Pacific, The King and I, Me and Juliet, Pipe Dream, Flower Drum Song and The Sound of Music. They wrote the musical film "State Fair" and the TV presentation of "Cinderella".

Early in 1950 they received a call from Fanny Holtzman, Gertrude Lawrence's lawyer, asking if they would be interested in writing and producing a musical adaptation of "Anna and the King of Siam" with Gertrude Lawrence as "Anna". At first their feelings were decidedly mixed - they had never before written specifically with one actor or actress in mind and they were concerned that such an arrangement might not give them freedom to write what they wanted the way they wanted. On the other hand, here was an opportunity to write for one of the theatre's genuine stars. After seeing a screening of the film at the 20th Century-Fox office they were finally convinced that the story had the making of a beautiful musical play.

With the "I" in "The King and I" already cast, they began thinking about "The King" but became thoroughly discouraged until auditions were held for the part at the Majestic Theatre. The first candidate who walked out from the wings was a bald, muscular fellow with a bony, Oriental face. He was dressed casually and carried a guitar. His name was Yul Brynner. Scowling, he sat down on the stage and crossed his legs, tailor-fashion, then plunked one whacking chord on his guitar and began to howl in a strange language that no one could understand. He looked savage, he sounded savage, and there was no denying that he projected a feeling of controlled ferocity. When he read for Richard and Oscar, they were again impressed by his authority and conviction - they looked at each other and nodded. They had found their King.



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THE NAIROBI CITY PLAYERS

IN SEPTEMBER, 1956 an "acting group" was formed to be known as the Nairobi City Players, and in its Constitution set down the following aims and objects:—

- (a) Regularly to present theatrical productions of a good dramatic and artistic standard by utilising and co-ordinating the best available acting talent, producers, set designers and technical stage assistants.
- (b) Towards the fulfilment of (a) above, to be unstinting in the cost of production, subject to the limit set by the Standing Committee.
- (c) To take all necessary steps to encourage the drama and to improve the facilities available for theatrical productions.

The City Players have adhered rigidly to these aims from their formation and since that time have presented a total of 83 productions including 27 full scale musicals, mostly at the Kenya National Theatre.


