
Gertrude's Garden Children's Hospital is unique of its kind, being the only independent Hospital from Cairo to Johannesburg, established 35 years ago by Colonel Ewart Grogan, pioneer extraordinary who donated his own house and 16 acres of land in Muthaiga. It is a non profit-making multi-racial children's hospital with 25% of their beds free for needy children, run on a self-help basis, and made possible through the efforts of the Appeals Fund Committee and assisted by service clubs such as Rotary and Round Table.

Since its formation in March 1969, the Rotary Club of Nairobi North has always been interested in "Gerties" or "Gerts" as the Hospital is affectionately known, as one of its service projects; be it with financial help to build a new wing, or for the equipment to go in it, or even running the annual children's Christmas party.

Three years ago the club allied itself with the Hospital's Appeals Fund committee for further expansion, by having the project approved by Rotary International as a World Community Service Project, to which end the Hospital's Appeal Brochures were despatched to 180 matched District clubs in Michigan and Wisconsin, U.S.A. and other individual clubs in Europe.

As the result of this special "Gerts" has received two consignments of medical and surgical equipment, and donations to the value of some US\$ 90,000 from the Rotary Clubs of BROOKFIELD, FRANKENMUTH, RACINE, CAPE CORAL, FORT MYERS SOUTH, as well as the Rotary Club of CHATHAM in U.K.; further donations being offered.

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
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
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
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THE DIRECTOR AND CHOREOGRAPHER ____ BENNY GOODMAN

B ENNY is affectionately known as the Resident Genius of the Nairobi City Players. He has done almost everything in theatre and, since coming to Kenya in 1950, mostly for the NCP. He first made a name for himself playing an ugly sister in Cinderella in 1955, then again, also in Cinderella, in the part of Buttons in 1961. Both at the Kenya National Theatre.


Benny the actor, has also played, the Cowardly Lion in The Wizard of Oz, Nicely, Nicely Johnson in Guys and Dolls, Sancho Panza in Man of La Mancha and Fagin in Oliver. In The Fantastics (1977) he played The Girl's Father and in 1982 The Old Actor, as well as directing both productions. In 1983 he directed Happy as a Sandbag and also played various roles in it.


Other City Players' shows directed by him include Kiss Me Kate, The Real Inspector Hound, Pirate of Penzance, H.M.S, Pinafore, The Gondoliers and last year's memorable production of Cinderella for which he also did the lighting design and helped with the set design. He has designed the sets for many shows, the most challenging being My Fair Lady, which required eleven changes.

Benny the lighting designer and operator for the City Players and other groups has created most imaginative effects for Godspell, The King and I, Oklahoma and Side by Side by Sondheim.

Benny, the actor, was to have played Nicely, Nicely Johnson again in the 1979 production of Guys and Dolls, but instead he was flown to London for open heart surgery. He bounced back, still smiling, in time to be lighting operator for that same show, with the aid of helpful friends pushing him up the ladders.

Real life Benny is a director of Data Centre Ltd. If he isn't slaving over a hot computer he can be seen resting in the shade of the tomato plant growing in his office. Benny's wife Brenda and their two children share his infectious enthusiasm for all things theatrical.





MUSICAL DIRECTOR — BARRY JOBLING

B ARRY JOBLING is a talented young professional musician who has been specially engaged for this production. He studied the piano with John Barstow at the Royal College of Music and conducting with Richard Austin.

He has worked with the Ballet Rambert and with the Scottish Ballet for whom he wrote two complete scores. Barry has performed throughout the United Kingdom as a soloist and is very much in demand as an accompanist.

At present he is Musical Director of the Else Mayer Lismann Opera School and at the beginning of 1985 he started his own Experimental Opera Group.

For this production Barry has trained all the singers in the cast and played at all rehearsals. For the actual run at the Kenya National Theatre he will head a group of musicians including, at the other keyboard, Arthur Fell, an outstanding pianist who is very well known for his work with the Askari Stompers, the popular traditional jazz band.

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THE BALLET CHOREOGRAPHER - MARGARET HADDAD

ARGARET HADDAD was born in Thetford, England. At the age of 10 she was the first person to receive 2 scholarships to study ballet for 6 years at The Legat School of Russian Ballet. She Passed all the examinations and was being trained to teach Classical Ballet, National Character Dancing and Yoga. She later danced professionally for 8 years; in England in pantomimes, on television, in ballet tours and one year in "The King and I"; in Europe and the Middle East she performed in musicals, films, cabaret and television, gaining even more valuable experience. Margaret became an advanced teacher with the Russian Ballet Society and, after her marriage to Fouad Haddad, she made her home in Beirut, Lebanon, where she opened her own ballet school. For 12 years she taught and produced her own ballet shows for theatre, and television and undertook the choreography for musicals and cabaret, including "The Merry Widow", "Belle Helene" and many Gilbert and Sullivan productions. Since her arrival in Nairobi in 1975 she has worked with Nairobi City Players, choreographing their productions of the "The Merry Widow", "The King and I" (in which she also danced the principal part of "Eliza"), "Oklahoma", "Guy and Dolls" and "Cinderella". Her other productions in Nairobi include producing and choreographing two children's Ballets - "Alice in Wonderland" and "Bambi", for which the entire proceeds were donated to charity. Last year Margaret became the sole recipient of a Professional Teachers Diploma awarded with highest honours to mark her 21 years of teaching ballet. This award was from the Russian Ballet Society in England. The Children performing in the ballet for "Aladdin" range in age from 7 - 17 years.





ATRICIA EAMES (Aladdin) first appeared on stage at the age of ten in *Humpty Dumpty*, in Zimbabwe. Later, in London, she appeared often in college and repertory company productions. Pat came to Nairobi in 1971 and within six weeks was playing Sandie in The Theatre Group's *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* and Hansel in the Nairobi Music Society's *Hansel and Gretel*. Other starring roles in Theatre Group productions followed, for example in *The Dream and Hedda Gabler*, both directed by her husband, John. She had a leading role in City Player's Hello Dolly in 1972. In June last year she played the part of Tessa in the Nairobi City Players production of The Gondoliers, and Prince Charming in their highly successful production of Cinderella. Pat is head of the Art Department at Banda School and has been heavily involved in theatrical productions there — as assistant director, choreographer, costume designer, set designer and make-up artist!



AYE NICOLAISEN (Princess Baldroubadour) is appearing in her first major role with the Nairobi City Players, after being part of the chorus in Cinderella last year. Faye has sung with the Rift Valley Chorale and has recently auditioned for the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London. She is at present taking Business Studies at a college in Nairobi.

OHN HUMPHRIES (Widow Twanky) has sung tenor parts in choral concerts for over 20 years. He has directed musicals in various schools in the U.K. as well as often composing them himself. Coming to Kenya in 1982, he has continued this habit at Braeburn School, composing and directing "The Pearl Reef" in 1983 and "Persephone" last year. He appeared as Don Alhambra in "The Gondoliers and as Tutti or ugly sister in Cinderella for Nairobi City Players last year.





HRISTOPHER COUTINHO (Wishee Washee) showed his first taste for the theatre in 1973 when only 9 years old, he appeared in the St. Mary's School production of The Gondoliers. Still at St. Mary's he played solo parts in the Mikado and The Pirates of Penzance. For the Nairobi City Players he has appeared in The King and I, Guys and Dolls, The Gondoliers and as Buttons in Cinderella. In 1982 he starred in the Kenya Music Festival winning three first prizes in the tenor, folksong and oratorio classes for those over eighteen years of age.



AUREEN TURNER (Empress) is a full-time housewife who manages to fit the demands of the theatre into her daily routine. She has appeared in many of The Nairobi City Players productions, the most recent playing Dandini in Cinderella. She has also been involved with The Theatre Group, The Music Society and with the Phoenix Players.

PAUL WEBSTER - (Emperor). Gave up singing six years ago when he left London and never intended to start again. In London he was a member of the London Philharmonic Choir for 3½ years and sang with many smaller choirs. His stage experience was limited to school productions until last year when he played Baron Hardup in The Nairobi City Players production of Cinderella. He now spends most of his time working on electron microscopes. He arrived in Kenya two years ago, from West Germany.





ERRY MURRAY (Abanazar) makes his first appearance on the Nairobi Stage. For four years he was a member of the Arusha Amateur Arts Society and appeared in: The Miracle Worker, A Murder Has Been Arranged, Hickory, Dickory, Dock (Pantomime) and various Revues. Born in South Carolina, he is an architect for church sponsored development projects in East Africa and Madagascar. We welcome him into the fold and hope to see him in many future productions.

A LLAUDIN QURESHI (Slave of the Lamp). A man of many talents — especially where the theatre is concerned. Writer, actor and director, also chairman of the local Asian Drama Group, Natak. For The Nairobi City Players he has appeared as Pradah Singh in Conduct Unbecoming, Kralahome in The King and I and stage managed for Toad of Toad Hall. For the Phoenix Players he appeared in both The Moon On A Rainbow Shawl and Midsummer Nights Dream. On the screen he appeared in Living Free, Check Point and more recently Out Of Africa. He has also published a book of original plays entitled Aashiana, and is a freelance drama critic for the Sunday Nation.





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



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ADVERTISER'S ANNOUNCEMENT

Aids

SIR-In view of the eruption of Aids in Africa it comes as some surprise to me that mosquitoes are not included on the list of suspected transmitters of Aids (August 18th). I presume there is a biological reason why they could not be considered at least partly responsible for the spread of the disease. However, in terms of the simple mechanics of mixing blood, there would seem to me to be a strong parallel between the prick of an unsterilised syringe needle which previously had been used to inoculate an Aids sufferer and the bite of the unsterilised jaw of a mosquito which had previously drawn blood from somebody with Aids.

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
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
