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

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


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


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MESSAGE FROM THE ROTARY CLUB OF NAIROBI NORTH











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LARRY DREW —

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
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JOHN HUMPHRIES — Mother Goose

This is John's fourth time as a NCP 'Dame'. No wonder he is worried about becoming 'typecast' — but what would we do without his unfailing expertise. Currently music teacher at the Nairobi Academy, he first came to Kenya in 1982 following his father's footsteps who was here many years ago. John has also directed several musicals in U.K. often composing the music himself and last appeared in a more serious role of Mr. Bumble in the Theatre Group production of 'Oliver'.





LESLEY-ANNE McGUINNESS — Jill

Born in 1957 started her talented theatre career at the tender age of five appearing in numerous productions of the Little Theatre Club, Mombasa. Starring in 'My Fair Lady' and 'The Sound of Music'. She studied Ballet at the Elmhurst Ballet School, Camberley, Surrey under the direct supervision of Bridgette Espinosa. This is her first appearance 'on stage' in Nairobi since leaving Mombasa in 1984. NCP welcome Lesley and husband Rory to their midst. They have two lovely children Alexander and Serena.

ADAM NORRIS — Jack

Won our hearts with his performance in NCP's Pantomime last year when he played the part of Simple Simon. His theatre career started at the age of seven when he played the wicked fairy in Greenacres production of Sleeping Beauty. At Pembroke House School he played in several productions including Joseph, Peter Pan and Oliver in which he played the lead. Last of his school appearances was in Imani School's production of Ghost Train in 1982. Now a member of the NCP's team, Adam's last appearance was in The Old Time Music Hall.




MAUREEN TURNER — Willie

Wendy has been dancing since the early age of three and made her first public appearance in Easter Parade at the Knightstone Theatre, Weston-Super-Mare when only six years old. At fourteen she auditioned at Drury Lane for a part as one of the Siamese children in The King and I but although only 5'1" was considered too tall. She was a dancer in the Bristol Musical Comedy Club's production of Annie Get Your Gun at the Bristol Hippodrome. Later she was the lead singer in a semi-professional close-harmony trio which achieved considerable local fame in and around her home town of Bristol. Over a five-year period the group made several television appearances, radio and of course many concerts and cabarets all over the West Country. Wendy has been in Nairobi for a number of years and has appeared in the NCP's productions: Cinderella (1984) as the Bear, in Aladdin as the Panda (1985) in Annie last year and in The Old Time Music Hall this year.

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
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
