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

THE NAIROBI CITY PLAYERS

You may be wondering who the Nairobi City Players are and why this new group has been formed. Here then is a little about ourselves and our aims and objects.

Nairobi has a wealth of theatrical talent out of all proportion to its size, and we are endeavouring to pool and co-ordinate this with the intention of presenting four first class productions each year at the Kenya National Theatre. Each production will be carefully planned well ahead and the best possible cast and stage staff obtained.

The cast and technical staff of the current production, together with a few more well known names in Nairobi theatre, form a nucleus on which to develop our policy. We are a group of both ex-professional and amateur players combining to make a very experienced team, whose firm intention is to offer really good "theatre" for Nairobi. It should be stressed that we are a team, producer, actors and stage staff all working together very closely to realise our aim. The present production has been a very happy one, with all concerned working in harmony and we intend to retain this close co-operation in all of our future productions.

"The Love of Four Colonels" by Peter Ustinov was chosen as our opening production in the first place because it is an excellent play by a brilliant playwright.

A further important consideration is that it gives an opportunity for everyone to show their paces. The actors have to deal with some widely differing styles of playing and some strong characterisation is called for by the script. The stage staff also have a wonderful opportunity, as the set itself requires ingenuity in design, construction and lighting. We have all enjoyed working on this play and hope that you feel that the result justifies our efforts.

The audience is the most important factor in any theatrical presentation, and, without your support, we cannot attain our object. If you have liked this play we would ask you to help by completing the tear-off sheet below. A list of plays is given, all of which we should like to present in the future. We want to know the type of play you would prefer to see. Would you therefore please mark an "X" against the three plays which most appeal to you in the list. To stage a production in the Kenya National Theatre is a considerable financial risk and we must therefore be guided by you as to the type of play you would be likely to enjoy. Most of the plays we have in mind will be expensive from the point of of view of set and costumes. We have only limited resources and therefore ask for your support and encouragement to carry out our policy of combining the best available talent in Nairobi to present four really worthwhile productions each year.
